In response to your correspondence dated March 27, 2017, the Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) - International Events and Convention Services Program (IECSP) officially recognizes the following event:

## Medical Image Computing and Computer Assisted Intervention (MICCAI) 2017 September 10 - 14, 2017 Quebec City Conference Centre Québec City, Québec

The information provided to the CBSA states there will be approximately 1250 attendees to which 80% are foreign to Canada and that the event is not open to the general public with no sales.

As outlined in your correspondence, this event is expecting approximately 10 foreign exhibitors who are importing display booths, promotional materials and medical imaging equipment for demonstration at the event.

It should be noted that, non-Canadian exhibitors may import display items and exhibit booths temporarily as outlined in the provisions of tariff classification **9993.00.00.00** duty free, on the condition that the goods will be exported from Canada upon the completion of the event.

Goods imported as "giveaways" must be accounted for at time of release on a <u>Form B3</u>, *Canada Customs Coding Form* with all applicable duties and/or taxes collected at the time of importation.

Under certain circumstances, the CBSA may waive the requirement for goods being temporarily imported to be documented on the Temporary Admission Permit (Form E29B) as well as the posting of a security deposit.

At the time of exportation, goods granted temporary admission on a Form E29B or Carnet must be presented along with importer's/owner's copies of the appropriate documentation to CBSA for verification and certification. This presentation may occur at a CBSA office inland or at the port of export, depending on the circumstances involved and is necessary for you to receive a refund of any securities posted. Please note that the refund is not immediate.

CBSA requires everyone seeking admission into Canada to properly declare themselves to CBSA by providing accurate identification. CBSA will accept a valid passport as proof of citizenship.
